

{the linwood school}

For the past six years a group of landscape painters from the Central Ohio Area have held a retreat in Vermilion, Ohio at a private community called Linwood Park. This year was the third time I joined the group. The premise is simple: we rent the Linwood Lodge which provides dormitory-style housing, a community kitchen, and a living room; we do as we please, choosing to paint or sketch when we like and inviting others to join in; we share meals together and play games in the evening. We comically refer to ourselves "The Linwood School". During my five-day stay at Lake Erie I completed four oil paintings, sketched the beach using watercolor pencils, took plenty of photographs, and conducted a printmaking and book binding project in which the whole group participated. The following pages document my experience and my work.

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{beach grass}









The sky was very overcast and it seemed to merge with the color of Lake Erie. I walked along the beach until I found a clump of beach grass that interested me. I enjoyed picking out the variety of colors and modelling the textures. While I was painting, a man stopped by and pointed out all the different foliage in the area. I used a combination of palette knife and brushstrokes to render the wheat, blue grass, and grape vines. My fellow artists commented that they like that it is hard to tell where the sky ends and the water begins.



I passed a home with a pair of Adirondack chairs arranged in a peaceful setting. I decided to treat the composition as a value study, meaning that I would only use shades of black and white. But I could not resist adding in the colorful flowers, so I limited my color palette to Payne's gray and Permelba white, then used French ultramarine blue. viridian (green), alizarin crimson (red), and Winsor yellow to mix colors for the window frames, flower pot, and flowers. It was a good exercise that looks a little like a hand colored black and white photograph.


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{beach study}










As I searched for a good painting spot I came upon my friends Deb Haller and Michael Crapser who were sitting together on chairs facing the beach. They had a little party going and were listening to the Ohio State versus Indiana game on Sirius radio. I decided to join them but because the wind was somewhat strong I decided not to set up my easel and paint in oils. Instead I used Crayola watercolor pencils and a sketchbook. I am still experimenting with the capabilities of the pencils so I focused on applying pure color and washes of clean water.



I wanted to fit in another painting for the day but I needed to finish it quickly because the sun was going down and the light was changing rapidly. The group also planned to go out for dinner and I wanted to join them. I set up my easel along the road looking toward a volleyball net in the park with Lake Erie beyond. It turned out to be a high traffic area and quite a few people stopped to talk to me. They were all there to watch a jet ski competition that was taking place. I painted the hard light of the setting sun, the long shadows, and the jet skis buzzing in the distance.



















A group of children was playing on the beach. I added them to this painting of a staircase in front of a cottage. The initial drawing was very important in establishing the composition.

{printmaking project}

When I was in art school I took a printmaking survey class where we learned various printing techniques. The final project was a lesson in linoleum printing and the class decided to share their work with each other by printing enough editions that each student could bind together a book of prints made by their classmates. I still have that book. I thought a similar project would make for a fun activity at Linwood.

Linoleum, or "lino" prints are made using unfinished linoleum, the same material used in floor covering. It is similar to woodcut printing where material is carved away using a knife or gouge to make a relief surface that is then inked and pressed against a sheet of paper by hand or using a printing press. We used a press that my husband built for me with a marble rolling pin.

Once all the prints were complete, we used the Japanese style of bookbinding to make books for everyone and one for the Lodge..













