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{yarn around town}

For the past few years, delightful textile decorations have been appearing throughout the Clintonville neighborhood of Columbus, Ohio. The practice, called yarn bombing, is a form of street craft vandalism that artists and crafts(wo)men have used to make political statements, call a different kind of attention to an object, or simply to bring a smile to their neighbors faces.

"Yarn bombing" ('yărn 'bŏm • ing) is a type of graffiti or street art that employs colorful displays of knitted or crocheted yarn rather than paint. It is also called wool bombing, yarn storming, guerrilla knitting, knitffiti, urban knitting, or graffiti knitting.

The origin "grandma graffiti" is frequently attributed to Magda Sayeg, a Texas shop owner, who in 2005, covered the doorknobs of her boutique with knitwear that spelled out the word "knitting". From there she began tagging stop signs and lamp posts and assembled a crew of likeminded craftspeople called Knitta Please. Groups began springing up throughout the country and around the world including the Ladies Fancywork Society in Denver, Colorado, the YarnCore Collective in Seattle, Washington, Masquerade in Stockholm, Sweden, Knit the City in London, England and a woman known as Bali, in Melbourne, Australia. Each group uses this handmade, labor-intensive, craft to wrap bike racks, snuggle fire hydrants, and cozy up bus stops throughout the urban landscape.

Meanwhile, back in Columbus, the Clintonville Yarn Bomber (CYB), has put enough of a stamp on her environs that the PBS television show *Columbus Neighborhoods* came calling. The program interviewed about her work and plans for future projects. The interview was conducted in shadow and using voice-scrambling technology. She does wants to remain anonymous afterall. The following pages illustrate some her work.






