

In June I took part in a two-day papermaking workshop led by writer and papermaker, Ron Shaull. The Priscilla R. Tyson Cultural Arts Center in downtown Columbus was gracious enough to host our very wet activities. I met new people, made a lot of paper, and had fun. My previous experience was at the 4th-grade level, where your teacher puts newspaper through a countertop blender and you flatten out the gray pulp using a screen. The workshop was a bit more sophisticated, but the basic principles are the same. Mr. Shaull has a professional Hollander paper pulp beater, so he kindly provided the base for our creations in the form of cotton rag, corn husks, banana leaves, and even blue denim. The pulp is mixed up in large vats of water to create a slurry. Then a mould (screen) and deckle (frame) is used to scoop and strain the pulp. The paper is then transferred to a damp felt blanket, a process known as couching (pronounced "coo-ching").

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We learned how to couch the wet paper sheets into a post, which is a Dagwood sandwich made of felt blankets and paper sheets. And from there we were off and running. After a few sheets of standard paper, Mr. Shaull taught us to laminate different pulps together; add inclusions such as flower petals, leaves, and seeds; and how to enclose materials inside a sheet. We all started making interesting compositions and textured sheets. Some of the variations included: picture shapes, layers of color, papers with embedded textures, stationery with decorative elements, mandala forms, collaged newspaper articles and comic strips, and all sorts of abstractions.

Once our posts became tall enough, we put them in a press to squeeze out the excess water. Then the drying process began. We separated each sheet of paper and placed them between layers of cardstock and cardboard. Then Mr. Shaull set up a box fan to blow air through the corrugation of the cardboard to help dry the papers.

The following day, our creations were ready to be turned into paper airplanes, stationery for correspondence, or simply a piece of art. It was a fun two days of raisin-fingered fun.

Ron Shaull offers his papermaking workshops twice each year at the Priscilla R. Tyson Cultural Arts Center in Columbus, Ohio and at the Peggy R. McConnell Arts Center in Worthington, Ohio.
















{worthington area art league: nocturne}

Bill Westerman has been a fixture in the Worthington Community for many years. After retiring from his career as a pharmacologist, he embarked into the world of art. He is one of the original six founding members of the Worthington Area Art League which he helped to organize in 1969. He was instrumental in raising funds for the construction of the Peggy R. McConnell Arts Center. He was the driving force behind an art exchange program between sister cities Worthington, Ohio and Sayama, Japan-both of which hosted exhibits by artists from each nation. The U.S. exhibit was held at the MAC in 2012-2013. He has organized painting groups focused on landscapes, portraits and still lifes, most notably the group Central Ohio Plein Air. In fact, this very painting is from a portrait session that he both organized and volunteered to sit for. He now resides with his wife at Friendship Village in Dublin, where he has been hosting weekly portrait sessions with residents as subjects.


